# A HISTORY OF THE PATERSON YMCA CIRCUS CLUB



#### **Prologue**

I wish to dedicate this work to those in the Club who were mentors to me: Charlie and Lena Egg, Eleanor Egg, Pauline Wachter, George Puglia, Angelo Buono, Joe Fillenger, Tom Dunkley, Buck Newstrom; and also a custodian at the Paterson YMCA, Mr. William Staney - a godly man of great wisdom.

Work on this history was started in the year 2006 AD (in the year of our Lord) when the Club had been out of business for over 40 years. As a result, much of the history of the Club (especially in the early years) has been impossible to recover. As I started this work I soon found, much to my dismay, that programs from the various home shows were extremely unreliable. Names were omitted (or appeared when they should not have) and were often misspelled. In one program even the name Paterson was misspelled. Therefore to write a completely accurate history is very difficult, if not impossible. I have, however, worked hard to make this history as complete and accurate as I can. I wish to thank those who have helped me to rcover as much information as possible: David (Bones) Lewis, U rsula Pelle, John Grubb, Bob Gras, Edith Boher, Norma Schadegg, Arlene Scheetz, Joseph Temple, and the staff at the Paterson YMCA - especially Larry Gutlerner and Judy Hatch.

I was associated with the Circus Club over a period of about 15 years and participated in a wide variety of ways - all the way from having a bit part in my first Home Show, to directing three Home Shows. I was a young teenager at the time of my first show and 'came of age' while I was a member. I was a malcoordinated youngster. The kind of kid that everyone laughed at in gym class at school. However, when I started with the Circus Club no one laughed at or derided me. Instead, they help me improve my performance.

Being a member of the Club was one of the most valuable experiences I had as a young person. I found out that you don't present a two hour circus show without things going wrong - sometimes tragically wrong! In one show it got to be 'gut check time.' Seeing these difficulties unfold and learning to deal with them has been one of the most valuable lessons of my formative years.

Also I learned that there is a time for talk and a time for action. In the preparation of a show a lot of talk (exchange of ideas and debate) is essential to getting the best possible outcome. However, once the show starts the time for talk is over. It is time to do what has been planned and practiced while adjusting quickly as unforeseen difficulties arise.

There is no question that the Paterson YMCA Circus Club shaped my life in many positive ways.

#### Introduction

During the great depression of the 1930's the Paterson YMCA raised money by staging an annual circus each year from 1933 up to and including 1939. Professional and local acts were included in these shows. As an out-growth of this, the Paterson YMCA Circus Club was organized in 1939.

The first Annual Home Show was presented in April of 1940. It was clear that this was to be a continuing organization because the 1940 show was presented as the 'First Annual.' Twenty-four home shows were presented in the twenty-seven year lifetime of the Club. Some years the Home Show was presented on one night. Other years there were two presentations - Friday night and Saturday night. There were also many years when the Home show consisted of three presentations - Friday night, Saturday Night, and a Saturday afternoon matinee. All of these shows were presented in the main gymnasium of the Paterson YMCA at its location at 128 Ward Street.

Due to World War II no Home Show was presented in 1945 or 1946 because of a lack of manpower. All of the Home Shows were presented in the month of April except for: 1954 when the show was in March, 1963 when the show was in June, 1964 &1965 when the show was in May, and 1961, and 1962 when the Show was presented in August.

The club started out as a very structured organization. The constitution included provisions for monthly meetings, monthly dues (ten cents), and voting on prospective new members. As the years passed, the Club became less and less structured and when the final Home Show was presented in May of 1965 the organization had morphed into a gymnastics club.

However, only one can be documented with certainty - a show at the Paterson YWCA.

The Tale of the Three Jugglers

In the very first Home Show in 1940 three jugglers appear - Sidney Allbrecht, Elmer Kassner, and Joseph Temple. (See them in the photo of the 1940 and 1941 cast in Chapter I.) They appear again in the next three Home Shows. In 1944 they are missing from the roster. Presumably they were in the service. Here in 1947 two of them are back - Joseph Temple and Elmer Kassner. In 1948, 1949, 1950, 1951, and 1952 all three appear again under the stage name: The Nessens. This is a strong indication that by this time they were doing professional engagements on a regular basis. After this they never appeared in another Home Show - and the Club was poorer for it.

Lena Egg, the Grand Dame of the Trapeze

Even in 1947 Lena Egg was the 'Grand Dame' of the trapeze at the Paterson YMCA Circus Club. She was a talented trapeze artist. She was also involved in designing and making costumes for the Show, an instructor in the ladder act, ran an art studio in Haledon, and was the devoted wife of Charlie Egg. But there is more to the story than that. I learned the 'rest of the story' form her daughter, Eleanor, many years later.

Lena suffered from acrophobia! As Eleanor put it, "My mother was terrified anytime her feet were off the ground." However, her husband, Charlie, was a trapeze artist and she wanted to join him. So, she overcame her fear and not only joined him but became very accomplished in her own right. She faced many trials in her lifetime and handled them all with dignity and poise. She was a quality person - a blessing to all that knew her.

The Iron Triangle

In the late 1940's into the early 1950's I observed in Paterson what I called the Iron Triangle - the Paterson YMCA Circus Club, the Dance Studio (operated by Eleanor Egg), and the Paterson Swiss Turnverein. These three organizations were very different from one another, with different structures, goals, and memberships. They did, however, reinforce each other with many individuals being active in two or more of the three. Thus, these three very different organizations, all pursuing their own agendas, rather than competing with each other, or being rivals, actually benefited each other.







While Charles Egg is shown in the picture of the cast of the 1949 Home Show and is listed as a performer in the Home Show Program, he did not appear in the show that year because he was recovering from surgery for stomach cancer. However, even without appearing on the floor, his knowledge and experience helped shape the show and its presentation in many positive ways.

Charlie appeared to be recovering well, and spearheaded the push to prepare a high-wire act for the 1950 Home Show. No wire act had been presented since 1947, and a whole new set of wire walkers had to be trained - that is, of course, except for Charlie for whom wire walking was 'old hat.'

Extra practice sessions were scheduled for the wire-walkers and everything came together for an exciting new act for the 1950 Home Show. Thus the stage was set for that terrible opening night (April 14, 1950) of the 9th Annual Home Show.

A FIRST HAND ACCOUNT OF A TRAGIC EVENT

"What's up with you Jerry? You look as if something is bothering you," someone said to me the night of the dress rehearsal for the 1950 Home Show. "I don't know," I replied, "I just have a bad feeling about this show." There was no reason for this

feeling. The preparation for the show had gone well. I, however, could not shake this feeling - even after the first performance had started.

However, once the Show started, I had little time to think about it. I had appeared in The Grand Entry, Tumbling, Parallel Bar, and Statuary acts, and had taken a hot shower to clean up after statuary and run up to the auxiliary gym, while the high wire act was on, and was siting on the floor, mentally reviewing my routine for the rings act one last time, when I heard a loud crash from the main gym where the Show was in progress. Charlie Egg had fallen from the high wire. Charlie was alive but severely injured. He had broken his hip in five places.

The Show was temporally halted so that Charlie could be taken to receive medical treatment.

Now, everyone in the Club knew that many of the things that are done in circus acts were inherently dangerous and that serious accidents could occur. This, however, was different. It had gone from a theoretical possibility to a real occurrence, and everyone, including me, had to face the real risk in their various acts.

The next act up was the flying rings where, using two sets of rings, Arnold Peters and I would do a synchronized routine. We talked it over and decided to go on as planned. (No one would have gotten on our case if we had decided to scrub.) There was time to say a prayer and to again get the routine ready in my mind.

The Show resumed and the wire act was concluded with a clown act on the wire by Johnny Provenzale. As I watched him do his clown routine before a terrified audience (They were afraid that they were going to see a second fall from the wire.) I was amazed by how calm and self-assured he was, after what had just happened.

When the ring act was announced and Arnold Peters and I walked out on the floor, I wasn't afraid, I was flat out terrified! I could feel the walls of my stomach touching together. However, when we were picked up by the spotlights, years of training kicked in. I smiled and saluted the audience as if everything was OK.

The routine went exceptionally well that night, and Arnold and I were in perfect sync until we got to the dismount. I had been having trouble with my dismount because I had a tendency to release the rings a little late. This would lead to over-rotation. Thus, because of the extra stress, I was determined to make my release on the early side of optimum. However, when I got to that point, I couldn't let go. I felt like my hands were glued to the rings.

As I reached the optimum point, and still couldn't release, my fear rose sharply - making it even harder to do what I had to do. Passed optimum I could see in my periphery that Arnold had released and was in the air and I was still frozen with fear.

I finally did let go, and what happened then still continues to amaze me whenever I think about it. Suddenly all the fear was gone, and I could think clearly. I had let go too late to make a clean landing, but I knew what to do. I stretched out to make my body as long as possible to slow my rotation and when I landed I did a back extension roll to my feet and saluted the audience as if I had planned it that way all along.

Arnold had landed a fraction of a second before I did and could have stood and saluted, but when he saw what I was doing he also did a back extension roll. Thus we finished in sync, with only a minor difference on the dismount. The audience was blissfully unaware of the drama that had unfolded before their eyes.

However, the larger drama of what occurred that night was not nearly so benign. Many people in the Club were faced with the same fears that had, overcame them, and were stronger for it. The remainder of that first performance went without incident, as did the two performances the next day, but the impact on the Club was very negative and long lasting.

Charlie did recover from his fall, but died within a year of stomach cancer. Thus, his last show was marred by the tragic event of that night. Also, for most Club members, future shows would be less carefree, where we could, and often did, laugh about all the things that went wrong during a show. Now, in everyone's mind, there was the harsh reality that things could happen that were not a laughing matter.

For this and many other reasons the Club began a slow decline that would not be reversed until Ton Dunkley returned to Paterson.

## **Chapter 4**

## The Club Under the Leadership of Tom Dunkley

When Tom Dunkley became Associate Physical Director at the Paterson YMCA the Club started on a 'renaissance' period of it history. The following is a summary of this time written by Tom in the fall of 1954.

#### THE "Y" CIRCUS CLUB A BALL OF FIRE

1952: Shows at YMCA's in Passaic, Ridgewood, Hackensack, and Paterson with over 500 spectators total. Represented at Haledon Recreation Department Halloween Parade. Home Show attendance 500 plus. Contributed to World Services. Silver Lake contribution of \$330. Membership approximately 20.

1953: Almost 20 Shows at YMCA's in Plainfield, Montclair, Passaic, Orange, Metuchen, and Paterson. Also at Passaic Turners, Vocational High School, Central High School, Lake Mohawk, Packanack Lake, Totowa First Baptist Church, and Pompton Dutch Reformed Church. Represented on Contest Carnival TV programs and in the Paterson Chamber of Commerce Christmas Parade. There were over 4,300 spectators besides the thousands watching the TV show and the Christmas Parade. Home Show attendance was 500 plus. Contributed to World Service and over \$250 to the "Y" Camp. Membership approximately 30.

1954: As of September Ist, more than 35 shows at YMCA's in Hackensack, Montclair, Passaic, and Paterson. Appeared at Paterson and Hackensack YMHA's, Alexander Hamilton Hotel, Totowa Baptist and Tenafly Presbyterian churches, Midvale Reccreation Hall, Eastside High School, School No. 5 Paterson, Fair Lawn Lincoln School, Lazaras Hall (Paterson), Union Turnverein, Passaic Turnners, Wyckoff Lincoln School, Clifton High School, outdoors at Westwood and Hacketstwon. Represented two times on Ted Mack TV Show and four times on Contest Carnival. Over 7,000 spectators plus thousands of TV fans. Contributed to World Service, and approximately \$600 to the "Y" Camp. Membership 55 plus honorary status including "Mr. New Jersey" Carl Stelzen, "President of National Circus Fans Club" Joe Minchin, "Dance Teacher" Eleanor Egg, "Dance Teacher" Dottie Locker, "Professional Juggler and Comedian" Laddie Lamot and well known local figures such as M.C. Pat Ferro and former Circus Clown "Tramp" McNally.

Under the leadership of President George Puglia and Vice President Jerry Krawitz, the club has made a tremendous impression on thousands of persons. Coaching each other has been the club's policy and with tips from "Rocky" Buono, Fred Pullen and others, the outfit was bound to advance. Coaching from the fairer sex was evidenced by Kitty Cain, Norma Aehlich, and Barbara Boudreau among others.

The age range has been from preschoolers to great grand-dads. Laddie Lamount runs a close second to Henry Crist in length of active years. (That's about two thirds of a century.)

Following World War II, a different but ambitious "Y" Circus Club pledged \$5,000 to the newly forming YMCA Silver Lake Camp. The camp has completed four years of service and the Circus Club's contributions have surpassed the \$4,000 mark. A cabin now displays a plague reading to the effect that the Paterson YMCA Circus Club has presented the cabin.

Of course, there were many social good times, most outstanding being Jerry Calkin's farewell as he left for the Army, and the biggest of all, the Christmas party.

The Club is proud of its many members now in colleges such as Barbara Jacobs, majoring in Physical education at Spring-field college. The Club is also proud of its many compliments on performances. But most of all, the Club is proud of itself, the YMCA Circus Club.

### Activity in 1956

#### THE 1956 HOME SHOW

The 1956 home show is a show that should have never happened. In fact, it would not have, except for the actions of a dedicated member of the Paterson YMCA Circus Club (Angelo Buono) and a Janitor (William Stanley) at the Paterson YMCA. Oh yes, I was also caught up in this strange and unlikely web of events in the spring of 1956.

I had a 'bit' part in the first home show after World War II (1947) and appeared in every hone show after that up to and including the 1953 show. Then my rich uncle (Uncle Sam) sent me on a two year, expense paid, guided tour of the world - it was well guided. Upon retuning from my two year odyssey, I found that there had been trouble at the Paterson YMCA - big trouble. I spent several months talking to as many people as I could trying to find out just what had happened.

I never did ascertain all the details but I did determine that, at least in my opinion, the administration of the Paterson YMCA had acted badly. There was still a fragment of the Club at the Paterson YMCA – with other fragments elsewhere. Being that I only had one year before I would be going away to college and that I had no desire to spend that year confronting the 'powers that be', I started working out at the Montclair YMCA. As far as I was concerned I had walked away from the whole mess and was not about to look back.

Fortunately, Angelo Buono was much more loyal to the Club than I. He was not only working out at the Montclair YMCA but also still working with the Club at Paterson. One night he pulled me aside and asked me to come back to Paterson again. I told him, in detail, my complaints over the way the Paterson YMCA had handled the events that took place while I was away, and that I had put the whole affair behind me and was looking forward to going off to college. Thus, once again I had washed my hands of the whole affair and walked away. However, this was not to be the final resolution.

On the very next Sunday as I was leaving church, Mr. Stanley, an Elder of my church, called me over. He said to me, "I defended you last week." I replied, "Oh?" Then he said, "The remarks you made in Montclair where repeated at the Paterson YMCA and there were some who asked what right you had to make those remarks. I told them," he continued, "who you were and what right you had to make those comments." Then he said, "Here is what I want you to do. Go to the Paterson YMCA and talk to Mr. Ray Goode." Well, that was the last thing in the world that I wanted to do, but Mr. Stanley was an old friend of my family and I really had no choice.

I put it off as long as I could and on the next Saturday afternoon I went to Ray Goode's office and introduced myself. Ray said, "Come in and sit down and tell me what you think." Now there was an invitation to speak frankly! I did just that. Then he said, "Now let me tell you what I think." And so, we talked back and forth for what seemed to me at the time just a few minutes, but later when I left his office I realized that we had talked for hours.

The whole conversation came to an abrupt end when Ray said, "You know, of course, this whole discussion is academic because this year for the first time in its history, except for the World War II years, the Circus Club will not be able to present its Annual Home Show in April. Let's face it - the Club is dead." I immediately replied, "It is not! We can start working right now and present the Annual Home Show on the last weekend in April." "We!?" exclaimed Ray. Being young, brash, and foolish I said, "I can do it!" Then Ray said, "Jerry if you will return and work with the Club, I will help you any way that I can." On my way home, all I could think of was: "Good grief! What have I gotten myself into now."

For months after that day, every Saturday afternoon I walked into Ray's office and said, "Ray, in the last week the Paterson YMCA has done this, this and that, and I don't like it at all." Then Ray would say, "In the last week the Circus Club people

have done that, that, and this, and I don't like it either." Then we would get down to serious discussion and settle everything - for a week. We got to be great friends and the Circus Club grew and prospered.

The annual home show was presented on the last weekend in April and it was a good show. I, however, have bittersweet memories of that show. On one hand, it was an achievement that the show happened at all and the Club, once thought to be dead, had been revived. On the other hand, I knew that it could have been much better, were it not for the inexperience of that young, brash, and foolish Director.

Thus in September, thinking that it had been a very strange year with many unexpected events and not knowing if I would ever be in another home show, I left for college. Of course I did not know, could not know, that just five years later I would be caught up in an even much more strange web of unlikely events that would surround the 1961 and 1962 home shows - but that's another story.

### Chapter 6

### Two Turbulent and Strange Years

These two years are considered as a unit because of the strange web of events that link the 1961 and 1962 Home shows.

I graduated from the College of Wooster in June of 1961 - after cramming four years of undergraduate study into five years. I was due to start graduate work at Ohio University in September. The previous summer I had gone to Arizona with a buddy, and the two summers before that, I had spent working at a Boy Scout Camp. As my father was getting on in years and not in the best of heath, I decided to return to Paterson for the summer and spend some time with my family before going off to graduate school. I had two expectations for the summer. One was to spend time with my family and the other was to get a summer job to make enough money to buy a good used car to take to graduate school. Thus, when I arrived home, I began a search for gainful employment. The search did not go well. It was one of those years when nobody was hiring tool designers and there was not much else available. One day I answered an ad in the newspaper only to find it was for selling sewing machines. This was not for me and I kept looking.

Two days later I answered another ad and it turned out to be the same sewing machine job. I was feeling a little discouraged, but then I realized that I was standing only a block and a half from the YMCA. Going for a 'long shot' I went to the Y to see if perchance they needed a locker room clerk or something. I asked to speak with Bill Lied (Physical Director) and was sent up to see him. When I told him that I was looking for work for the summer, he said that his assistant had left that very morning and he could hire me as Assistant Physical Director for the summer. I found out later that the man I replaced had some personal problems that he needed to deal with, and had been let go less than an hour before I arrived.

My duties would be primarily teaching the youth classes for the summer. Besides that there was 'coverage' - either Bill or I had to be present anytime the Physical Department facilities were open. Also, I would be in charge of any gymnastics or circus activities, but since the Circus Club had died again during my senior year of college, there wasn't any of this to be concerned with.

The next day I reported for work, went to my office and spent an hour or so blocking out a plan for the summer for each of the youth classes. Then I sat back and opened the left bottom drawer of my desk. Here I found records of the Junior Leaders Corps where I had been a member. Then I remembered something that had happened when I was in high school (Not really a high school, but rather Paterson Tech - better known in those days as: Bum's College.) One day we were asked to write down what job we would like to have in ten years. I wrote that I would like to be Assistant Physical Director at the Paterson YMCA. As I walked home that day I though to myself that it was a stupid thing that I had written. There was just no way that it could happen. But it had just happened and it had been ten years almost to the day! I though to myself, "I am living a dream. This is going to be a great summer."

Then I opened the bottom right drawer and found the records from the Circus Club. I though that since I had been involved in reviving the Club in 1956, it could be done again. Warming to the task, I choose a date to hold the show in late August, blocked out a line-up of possible acts, and set-up a preparation schedule to prepare for the show. When I had completed my work, I sat back and looked at what I had done an said, almost out loud, "No, let's face it, this time the Club really is dead. Let it rest in peace." Then I tore up my plans and threw away the pieces.

It was a great summer. I Spent time with my family and bought a good used car. The summer was winding down and I was looking forward to starting graduate school when one Saturday afternoon Bob Gras came up from Somerville to work out. We

tumbled, did trampoline, apparatus work, went for a swim, came back to the gym and tumbled and worked the trampoline a second time.

We had trouble on the trampoline because of the poor condition of the bed. I said, "There is an old bed in the Circus Club storeroom. Let's look and see if it is in better condition." We did and it wasn't. Then Bob said "We need a new trampoline bed." To which I replied," Look at the frame of the trampoline. It has been welded and rewelded and is all warped out of shape. What we need is a new trampoline."

We sat down in Bill Lied's office to think about it. Then Bob said, "I have an idea. Let's hold a Circus Show and raise the money to by a new trampoline." We went to work and blocked out a show which was to be held two weeks from the day we were sitting there - an impossibly short period of time. However, the show was held and went off well. Thus, for the want of a trampoline bed, the Club was revived again.

At the end of the summer Bill Lied took a position with Wagner College and was replaced at the Paterson YMCA by Art Thomson. I was replace by the individual I had replaced. He had spent the summer in rehab and was rehired - on probation. Thus, I left to begin graduate work in nuclear physics thinking that it had been a great, but rather strange, summer. Little did I know that I would be caught up in an even stranger web of events before the end of the year.

At Graduate School I was fully occupied trying to keep my head above water in nuclear reactor theory, differential equations, and other 'fun' courses and I had essentially no contact with the Club, except that I did hear that the man I had replaced as Assistant Physical Director and whom had replaced me at the end of the summer had been fired again.

At the beginning of Christmas break I drove home arriving late at night and slept-in the next morning until at 9:30 when I was awakened by a call from Art Thomson. Art told me that since his assistant had been let go he was working extra long hours and asked if I could work during my Christmas break so that he could get some time off. Now, this was not how I wanted to spend my vacation time but I understood his situation and told him that I would work. He told me to come in at 5:00 p.m. and we would work out my work schedule.

When I arrived Art told me what hours I would be working and as he was leaving he pulled a 'Lt. Columbo' on me. Stopping in the doorway he said, "There is one more thing. When the Circus Club people come in tonight, get the names of all those who are going to be in the show Saturday. We need them for a newspaper story."

Two hours later as the Circus Club people were starting to drift in, I was sitting in my office talking to old friends about old times and thinking to my self, "This is not so bad. I am sitting here talking to old friends about old times and getting paid to do it." Then one of the younger members of the Club poked his head in the door to say hello and I recruited him to get a list of all those who were going to be in the upcoming show. When he came back with the list and I looked at it and when I saw how many names were on it, I knew at once, that I had been had. I asked for a meeting of the Club officers.

When they were assembled in my office I asked a series of questions to which I really already knew the answers. "This is a full scale circus show, right?" The answer was, "Yes." "It has been blocked out and tonight is dress rehearsal, right? This time the answer was, "No." Finally I said, "At least the show has been blocked out, right?" Paul Bohrer answered, "We were waiting for you to do that."

With a sigh, I said, "Well, let's get started." Fortunately we were working with very experienced people. There would be no dress rehearsal. Each person took responsibility for one or more acts and would have them ready. The rest was my responsibility. I spent the next day scoring the show. Again with experienced people, so long as I choose appropriate music for each act the performers did not have to hear it in advance. I also recruited a sound and light crew and scheduled a rehearsal for them on Friday afternoon.

On Friday morning I told Art Thomson that we had a problem with the show. He said, "What is it." I replied that there wasn't going to be any audience. The only advertising that had been done was the one newspaper story. "That" I said, "Will bring us two people." Art told me not to worry about it because the only thing our department was responsible for was present-

ing the actual show. Everything else was being handled by a different department. It was obvious that there was more to this than meets the eye, but I was too busy to worry about it at this time and went about finishing my preparations for the show.

The next night, just before show time, I looked out into the gym and saw that my prediction about the size of the audience was 100% correct - there were just two people in the audience. I went to auxiliary gym where the cast was gathered and someone said, "There is nobody out there!" I called everyone together and said, "We advertised a Circus Show, and two people have come to see it. They deserve to see a really good show just as much as if there were 200 people out there. Let's get out there and do a really good show!" And we did.

During the show, I took note that there were five other people observing the show. They were up on the track with the spot-light crew, and I recognized them. They were all members of Paterson YMCA Physical Department Committee. When I saw Art Thomson, first thing Monday morning, I said, "OK Art, tell me what's going on here." He said, "When the Circus Club was revived last summer there were some on the staff of the Paterson YMCA who were not pleased. They have been saying that the program aught to be dropped at every staff meeting all through the fall. Walt Lindell (General Secretary) was tired of all the arguing and ordered that the Club should present a show at Christmas time, which would be evaluated by the Physical Department Committee. The decision of the Committee would settle the matter. He further stipulated that all the Club was to do was present the show and those opposing the Club were responsible for everything else - publicity, seating, etc."

The group apposing the Circus Club, however, made a great blunder by assuming that show would be very poor, and when the Physical Department reported this, they would be able to say that the reason they didn't do the publicity etc. was that they didn't want the Paterson YMCA embarrassed in front of a lot of people. Therefore, being that the Committee reported that the show was excellent, but there was no audience, that is just two people, those who were opposing the Club were now 'in the dog house.'

I said, "Good, I am glad. They deserve it." Then Art said, Walt Lindell wants to see you first thing today. So you had better get on down to his office." When I arrived at Walt Lindell's office he congratulated me on the show and then said something for which I was totally unprepared. He said that if I would be willing to work the following summer, they would use part-time help until then and fill the position on a permanent basis at the end of that summer. I told him that I would let him know as soon as I got back to Ohio University.

When I got back to Ohio University I removed my name from the list applying for summer employment there, accepted the offer at Paterson, and started, via mail, (snail mail) bouncing ideas off everyone I knew in the Paterson area. I was determined to hit the ground running so that the Club could present one of its greatest Home Shows ever in August of 1962. What followed was one of the happiest summers of my life.

Preparation for the 1962 Home Show was not without its problems, but all things considered, on whole, it went well. As the show date grew near I was confident that it was going to be a good show. However, on the first night of the show, about fifteen minutes into the show, I realized that not only was it going to be a good show, but had the potential to be a really great show.

Then, immediately, I was in a state of panic. What if something were to go wrong and ruin everything? I started checking on every detail to keep this from happening - as if that were possible. At this point Joe Fillinger came to my rescue. I asked him if everything was covered for the statuary act and he said, "Jerry, go worry somewhere else. I have this under control." This rebuke brought me back to my senses and I relaxed and enjoyed the rest of the Show - that night and the next.

The Show that year was everything I had hoped it would be and more. My fiancée came to Paterson from Cleveland to see the Show and the day following the second performance we officially announced our engagement to cap off a really great summer.

The 1962 Show was the last I was in. It was fifteen years after that scrawny kid had a bit part in the 1947 Show (Thank You Buck Newstrom) and there is no doubt that those fifteen years changed my life forever.



Jack started at the Paterson YMCA in September 1929 as Associate Physical Director. Before he retired in September of 1946, he had risen to the position of Associate General Executive. During his tenure he started the: Bar Bell Club, Tennis Club, Camera Club, Program Council, Inter-Racial Commission, Girl's Service Organization, Owl Club, Outing Club, Junior Glee Club, and the Paterson YMCA Circus Club.
